Project Overview

The Perris Valley Pipeline is a new water delivery line that will provide substantial reliability benefits to a significant portion of western Riverside County. Eight feet in diameter and 6.5 miles long, the pipeline will run from Metropolitan Water District's Henry J. Mills Water Treatment Plant in Riverside, easterly along Alessandro Boulevard and then south to Harley Knox Blvd. in right-of-way paralleling Interstate 215.

Construction of the project's northern reach along Alessandro Boulevard and south to Cactus Avenue began in September 2007 and is scheduled to be completed by spring 2009. Construction of the project's southern reach between Cactus Avenue and Harley Knox Blvd. began in September 2008 and is scheduled to be completed in spring 2010.

The \$127 million project, being jointly developed by Metropolitan, Western Municipal Water District and Eastern Municipal Water District, will carry additional water to local agencies through separate pipelines being constructed along Cactus Avenue and Harley Knox Blvd., and a series of new turnouts and pump stations.

While the Perris Valley Pipeline will enhance the delivery capabilities of the Mills Water Treatment Plant, it is one of many projects and programs being implemented to meet retail, municipal and industrial water needs in the region. Others include major modifications and expansions of regional treatment plants, expanded water delivery facilities, conservation, reclamation, desalination of brackish groundwater, and water recycling.
